# What Are My Options?

- A. Participate under DOE School Food program and receive meals from DOE
- B. Become your own School Food Authority (SFA) and contract meal services with a private meal vendor



## What Are The Pros and Cons?



## Participate under DOE School Food

## **PRO**

- ★ DOE began participating in the Community Eligibility Program (CEP) in 2017, and <u>all participating</u> <u>sites</u> under DOE receive meals at no cost (all kids eat for free without regard to their eligibility)
  - Your school is responsible for reporting to DOE the number of meals served on a daily basis
- ★ Reduced paperwork involved (do not need the "Free and Reduced Meal Application")
- ★ All NYSED audits are the responsibility of DOE
- ★ All state reporting and program monitoring is conducted by DOE
- ★ Seamless operations in beginning of the year, when your time is stretched thin



## Participate under DOE School Food

### CON

- ★ Zero input on the menu, meal choices, number of options, quality of food
- ★ Limited serving options if your charter is in a private space with limited or no kitchen
- ★ If your school calendar differs from DOE Schools, limited meal service will occur on days DOE is not in service
- ★ If in a shared space with a DOE school, your meal serving times must fit around the DOE schools; little to no flexibility in creating your breakfast and lunch serving periods
- ★ After school meal programs not always available if DOE is not serving a snack or supper in your space (no staffing available); must pay for snacks/supper out of pocket



## Become a School Food Authority

## **PRO**

- ★ Increased control over meal program: Budget, Food Quality, Menu variety and choices
- ★ Can opt into after school meal programs (snack or supper) and summer meal program
- ★ Eligible for state and USDA grants: Equipment grants, Fruit and veggie grants, Garden grants, Breakfast program expansion grants
- ★ Choice of working with 6-7 different food vendor options and service styles
- ★ Benefit from food vendor partnership on nutrition education, food tastings, promotional materials



## Become a School Food Authority

## CON

- ★ Heavy paperwork/administration support needed
  - Responsible for all state reporting, audits, monthly claims, site monitoring, staff training, financial reporting
  - Receive reimbursements from NYSED and directly pay vendor on monthly basis
- ★ May not qualify for CEP and will need to either charge "paid" and "reduced" students or pay out of pocket for this cost
  - Would need to process all meal applications independently of DOE
  - Would need to purchase a Point of Sale software to track meals by eligibility
- ★ Many deadlines and program regulations to adhere to throughout school year
  - Would need a dedicated staff member as the "Food Service Director"
- ★ Cumbersome NYDOE Audit in year one, and every three years after; financial risk if program is not operating compliantly

## Tell Me More About Being a SFA

- → Process must start in early Spring (NOW!)
- → Deadline for all application documents is **JUNE 30th** to NYSED
- → What is needed for the application?
  - Current health permit from DOH in the space you will be serving
  - Identified Food Service Director and a food safety course completed
  - Compliant procurement process followed to select and secure a food vendor (contract must be submitted to NYSED)
  - ◆ The first month's menu with all nutritional analysis, showing it meets USDA meal pattern guidelines (requested from meal vendor to have prepared prior to June 30th)
  - Food Service Director must complete the 12 annual hours of training documentation due to state
  - Must establish and submit a School Wellness Policy



#### Procure a Vendor in NYC

Federal and State procurement regulations must be followed to contract with a meal provider. **CANNOT** contract directly with a vendor and skip the process.

- **2** Types of Food Service Contracts:
  - **A.** <u>Vended Meal:</u> Food company delivers and drop off meals; school staff preps, serves and counts
  - **B.** <u>Food Service Management Company:</u> Food company provides staff at your school to prepare/cook/deliver/serve meals (works with a kitchen or no kitchen)



#### Tell Me More About "CEP"

#### **Community Eligibility Provision**

→ A charter school that becomes a School Food Authority (SFA) can also participate in CEP <u>USDA CEP Information</u>

#### Requirements

- → Must be in at least second year of operation
- → Must have at least 40% of enrolled students qualify as "directly certified", meaning they are automatically free via state match system (A code on ATS list)
- → CEP application due to NYSED by JUNE 30<sup>th</sup>
